## 13. COUNTY ADMINISTRATOR'S REPORT

A. Mr. Bill Coleman - County Transportation Committee Update. Mr. Caulder stated Mr. Bill Coleman is the engineer with the County Transporation Committee and is here to give Council an update. Mr. Coleman stated he is with Infrastructure Consulting and Engineering (ICE), and this company is the CTC engineer for Fairfield County. The company is also a general engineer for the County under separate contract. The purpose of Mr. Coleman attending the meeting tonight is to explain how the CTC operates and to give some history. He invited Council to call him at any time with questions, and if he does not know the answer, he will find it guickly. The CTC members are appointed by the legislative delegation. At the present time, there are four members, and there have been as many as 12. There is no set number, and these are citizens from the community who serve unpaid with no mileage. The Committee has three to four meetings per year. The delegation also appoints the Chairman. The CTC is a spinoff from the C-Program. In the 1990s, the system was changed with the creation of the CTC's giving the counties the right and authority to spend their money. The sole purpose of the CTC is to spend the money that comes from DOT, and this money comes from the gas tax. In the year that just started, 3.99 cents of the .26 cents of gas tax goes to the CTC. The CTC runs from July 1 to June 30. The County is projected to get \$1,573,200 from the current year. The Committee receives the money and has to spend 1/3 on DOT roads. The rest can be spent on County roads. They are not limited to 1/3, but a minimum of 1/3 must be spent. Allendale County gets the least amount of money and Richland County gets the most. The apportionment is based on three things, 1/3 of the area of each county, 1/3 of the population and 1/3 of the rural roads. The rural roads are updated yearly, population is updated with the census, and the area does not change. Fairfield County is 2.28% of the area of the State. It has 1.52% of the roads in the State and the population is 0.52%. The current census may result in a small loss for the County. Fairfield County gets a total of 1.44% of the pie which is up to about \$110,000,000. This year, a joint venture is being done with DOT. DOT has a base crew, and they will do the base with the CTC doing the paving. The roads to be done are Rockbridge Road going to the new Molly Park at Wateree and about 2.5 miles of S99 starting at Sheldon Road going toward 215. The Committee allows Mr. Jamie Johnson, who is the resident maintenance engineer for the County, to make presentations for what he needs, and he is accommodated in every possible way because he knows what is needed. Mr. Coleman is involved in four different counties, and Fairfield County is the only one that has a committee comprised of citizens, and Mr. Coleman stated this works much better. All roads are built to SCDOT specs, including the work and the materials. Fairfield's CTC mission is to pave the dirt roads

of the County. After this year, there will be 96 unpaved roads in the County. Chairman Bell asked for Mr. Coleman to explain how the roads are paved per district. Per Mr. Coleman, there has been a formula for paving roads for about 10-12 years. This was improved upon about six years ago. The formula consists of the following: a residence gets 2 points, a church gets 2 points, a cut through road gets 5 points and then the density is the big item, to include houses per mile. If a road has 10 houses and is a mile long, it is awarded 10 points. If a road has 10 houses and is one-half mile long, it is awarded 20 points because there would be more houses per mile. Once the points are established, the districts are rotated. District 6 does not have any more roads, and District 7 will not have any more roads after this year. There are two exceptions to the rule, piggy backing (paving a spur that is less than 1000 feet, which is paved with the main road) and if there is a dirt road leading to the road to be paved, this will also be paved. Private drives are not done and common drives are not eligible for pavement. Every month, the CTC gets a statement from DOT that tells the bank balance, the income for that month and how much was spent. Interest is paid on the bank balance. DOT also keeps up with how much money is committed. The contracts of the CTC are County contracts, and these are done through procurement following the necessary procedures. The work is done, taking draws on a monthly basis, with the County paying the contractor and the CTC. A request is then sent to DOT for reimbursement. The County finances and DOT reimburses. Chairman Bell thanked Mr. Coleman for attending the meeting tonight and all the work the CTC does. Vice Chair Greene also thanked Mr. Coleman and appreciates that he responds very quickly to phone calls.

- **B.** Mr. Bryant Brown, GMK Associates, Inc. Courthouse Update. Mr. Caulder stated Mr. Brown was not able to make the meeting tonight. Chairman Bell stated Mr. Brown called him today and explained why he could not be here tonight. Chairman Bell stated Council Member Robinson asked a question at the last meeting. Based on this, Mr. Brown was requested to be here tonight. There have been no changes to the project scope, so the plan that was put forward continues to be done. Council has agreed to do this work. About a month ago, Mr. Brown met with the Finance Committee and some of the Courthouse personnel, and all of the work is going forward. Mr. Brown was requested to attempt to reduce the cost, and he is diligently working on this.
- **C.** Request of Action: Request Approval for Speculative Grading Project Number 12603.03. Mr. Caulder asked Mr. Davenport to give further details on this item. Per Mr. Davenport, he has been working with an engineering

firm, Davis & Floyd, to develop and design a rough graded pad in the Fairfield Commerce Center. As Council knows, the County is currently out of product. All existing buildings have been sold along with the spec building. There is available property in the Commerce Center, but it is raw. There is \$1M from the spec building sale and also \$660,000 of grant funding available. The engineer estimated the cost to be somewhere between \$1.6M and \$1.7M. The project was bid out, and there were eight bidders who responded. The low bidder was at \$1.129M, which is significantly lower than the budget. There is the possibility that there could be change orders due to unsuitable soil that would have to be removed or potentially expanding the pad if a user came in requesting this, so the difference between \$1.66 and \$1.129 cannot be spent at this time. Council is being asked to approve moving forward with the project. The contractor is currently ready to go with their equipment on flatbed trucks at the site. Motion made by Council Member Trapp, seconded by Vice Chair Greene, to approve the Request of Action. The motion carried 6-0.
